Hate is on the rise. Despite the fact that many hate crimes go unreported, U.S. Department of Justice data show that in New York State hate crimes rose by 31 percent in one year. In April of this year, the ADL reported that New York State leads the nation in anti-Semitic acts. On July 4, a firebomb was thrown at a sign in front of Fatima Al-Zahra Mosque in Ronkonkoma. In February, a Bayport man was charged with sending dozens of hate-filled letters to Long Island LGBTQ organizations. In January, a Long Island couple faced hate-crime charges after they verbally harassed a Black family.
